

Golden Globes 2026: Complete List of Nominated Films and the Biggest Snubs of the Season

As Hollywood accelerates into the heart of the 2026 awards circuit, the Golden Globes have once again taken center stage. The 83rd annual ceremony—set for January 11, 2026—has released its full slate of nominees, and with it, a clear picture of the films and creative talents likely to dominate conversations leading up to the Academy Awards.

This year's nominations showcase a blend of major studio powerhouses, globally acclaimed features and auteur-driven prestige titles. Although some front-runners lived up to expectations, the nominations also came with a handful of surprising omissions, leaving industry watchers buzzing about what these choices could mean for Oscar season.

Below is a comprehensive breakdown of which films triumphed, which contenders stumbled, and how the Golden Globe Foundation is continuing its shift toward greater international recognition.

Major Films Leading the 2026 Golden Globe Nominations

1. “One Battle After Another” — 9 Nominations

Paul Thomas Anderson's sharply crafted political thriller *One Battle After Another* dominated the nominations, emerging as the most recognized film of the year. The project, already noted for its star-packed ensemble, earned:

- Five acting nominations
- Best Comedy/Musical
- Best Director
- Best Screenplay

With nine overall nominations, Anderson's film stands as the clear Golden Globe front-runner. Its mix of high-stakes political tension, pointed humor and character-driven drama appears to have resonated strongly with voters.

2. "Sinners" — 7 Nominations

Ryan Coogler's genre-bending feature *Sinners* claimed seven nominations, positioning it as one of the year's major heavyweights in the drama categories. Blending vampire mythology with cultural commentary, Coogler's film scored recognition in:

- Best Motion Picture: Drama
- Best Director
- Best Cinematic Achievement
- Multiple acting categories

The film's fresh thematic approach and spring release have been credited for sustaining audience interest throughout the year, ultimately paying off during the nomination process.

3. "Hamnet" — 6 Nominations

Award-winning filmmaker Chloé Zhao returned to awards prominence with *Hamnet*, a historical drama inspired by the life and grief of playwright William Shakespeare and his wife, Agnes. The film secured six nominations across the dramatic fields, including:

- Best Motion Picture: Drama
- Best Actress
- Best Director

The film's emotionally layered storytelling and intimate period detail have made it a critical favorite throughout the season.

Global Voices Expand Their Footprint

One of the most notable trends in this year's Golden Globe nominations is the increasing international presence across categories traditionally dominated by English-language titles.

Films from **South Korea, Brazil, Norway and France** played a significant role in this year's nominee lineup, reflecting a growing willingness within the Hollywood awards ecosystem to embrace global cinema beyond designated "foreign film" categories.

South Korean entries, including *KPop Demon Hunters*, earned key nominations in acting and songwriting categories, while Brazilian and French productions made strong showings in animation and specialty categories. The Golden Globe Foundation appears to be signaling a continued shift toward rewarding global artistic excellence, not just domestic output.

Biggest Snubs of the 2026 Golden Globe Nominations

Even in a year with unusually broad representation, several high-profile titles failed to meet expectations.

"After the Hunt" — Luca Guadagnino's Drama Falls Short

Despite receiving early buzz as a potential awards juggernaut, Luca Guadagnino's post-MeToo psychological drama *After the Hunt* managed to land only a single nomination—for Julia Roberts's lead performance.

Industry insiders expected stronger recognition in directing, screenplay and overall picture categories, but the film's divisive reception appears to have limited its awards momentum.

"Wicked: For Good" — Underperforms in Major Categories

The long-anticipated sequel to last year's critical and commercial phenomenon *Wicked* also struggled to achieve major-category success. While *Wicked: For Good* did claim nominations for acting and original song, it failed to receive recognition for:

- Best Motion Picture: Comedy or Musical
- Best Director
- Best Screenplay

Given the strong legacy of the first film, this omission surprised many awards analysts who anticipated broader acknowledgments for the sequel's ambitious musical scope.

A Transforming Industry Sets the Stage

The 2026 nomination announcement arrives at a complex moment for the film world. Box office recovery has moved slower than anticipated after the pandemic, and the industry continues to grapple with high-stakes corporate realignments. Notably, streaming giants such as Netflix have escalated their influence, with reports of the company exploring strategic acquisitions of traditional studios—including the iconic Warner Bros.

This shifting landscape has blurred the lines between theatrical premieres, streaming releases and prestige television, making the Golden Globes' dual recognition of film and TV more relevant than ever. As more major filmmakers create crossover projects for streaming platforms, awards institutions are challenged to adapt to an evolving definition of cinematic achievement.

Why This Year's Golden Globes Matter for Oscar Predictions

The Golden Globes have long been regarded as a predictor—albeit imperfect—of the Academy Awards. While the Globes are often considered a more relaxed, star-driven event, patterns in their nominations frequently forecast momentum heading into Oscar voting.

The strong performances of *One Battle After Another*, *Sinners* and *Hamnet* suggest these titles could form the backbone of the Oscars' Best Picture race. Meanwhile, the international nominees' success hints at a broader global footprint in this year's Academy categories, particularly in directing and screenplay competitions.

The notable snubs will also play a role. Films overlooked here often face an uphill battle securing major nominations from the Academy, though surprises occasionally emerge.
